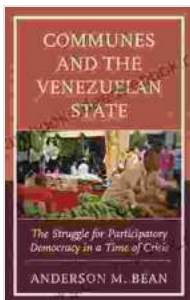


Communes and the Venezuelan State: A Historical Perspective

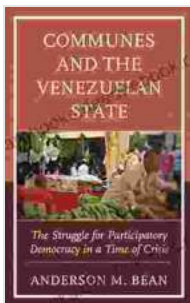
